Conrage in Crisis SPOTLIGHTING NELSON STREET OUTREACH

Program Overview

In 2016, the Nelson Street Outreach team was established to support vulnerable people in our community experiencing issues related to homelessness, mental health, and addiction, and to positively influence stakeholders' awareness and understanding of these challenges. The team offers low barrier services to anyone seeking assistance due to various and often-interconnected factors, such as living in poverty, inadequate housing, food insecurity, substance use, mental and physical health challenges, violence, or trauma. The work is rooted in a belief that all individuals are valued community members and have the right to receive support and access stabilization services in a manner that respects their dignity, their strengths, and their right to choose.

Outreach services range from providing basic needs such as access to clothing, food, and transportation; housing supports such as assistance with rental applications, help with moving, housing advocacy and funding support; facilitating access to healthcare such as addiction services, medical care, detox programs, and counseling; support navigating policies and systems to assist in acquiring identification, funding, or legal representation; emergency and crisis response such as responding to overdoses, mental health crises, or other community concerns; to every-day supports that often go overlooked like picking someone up in a snowstorm, providing socks, and engaging in sincere conversations.

The team works collaboratively with a wide variety of community groups and other social service organizations, as well as regional health services (hospital staff, pharmacists, doctors, nurse practitioners, counselors), employment and funding services, addictions treatment centres and detox facilities, faith-based organizations, food banks, housing providers, emergency services (ambulance, fire, police), and many more.



Increasing Demand

Demand for the services offered by Nelson Street Outreach have been steadily increasing since the outset of the program. Sadly, the overdose public health emergency and the provincial housing crisis continue to worsen in severity each year. The team feels a great need to expand capacity and hopes to secure additional funding to support increased hours of operation.

In the first year of the Nelson Street Outreach program, the team responded to 1 overdose. During the first six months of 2023, the team was first on scene at 10 critical overdose incidents and distributed 85 naloxone kits to at-risk people in our community.

The incoming call volume to the Street Outreach phone has increased steadily – recently, there has been as many as 120 calls in a single shift. Nelson and the surrounding communities have come to rely heavily on the team to provide urgent care to those most vulnerable in our area.

Supporting Family Members

Over the years, our team has developed many relationships with the families of the people we serve. Parents, brothers, and sisters, reach out when they no longer know how to support a family member that is struggling with homelessness, addiction, and/or mental health. We are often asked to pass on messages, deliver carepackages, coordinate meetups, and develop support plans that involve a person's family.

We listen to their concerns and share information to improve their understanding of the reality of the housing and overdose crises. We offer support and resources to families enduring the grief and loss of losing a loved one due to drug poisoning.

We often stay in touch with these families for years afterward.





Words & Reflections From Street Outreach

There is something immensely sacred in speaking with the mothers of those we serve.

Mother's call because they know we have been spending time with their beloved children – their sons and daughters who are now all grown up. They call with concern for their kids who are often deep in the throes of addiction and stranded in homelessness.

Mothers call from all over the country. They ask if we know their child, if we know that they are safe. These mothers want to help. They tell us about their beautiful babies - how they are skilled, caring, and intelligent - they tell us funny stories about their childhood. They ask us to pass on loving messages.

Mother's often travel here to find their little ones in rough shape – battered and bruised by the streets. These mothers wear brave faces; they are unfathomably determined and strong. They have come to bring their babies back to safety. We bear witness to the healing power of these reunions. These mothers have an impossibly profound resilience.

Mothers call us to weep when they learn of their child's passing. Mothers walk with us to the places where their child spent their final days. Mothers ask us about drug laws and stigma. Their loss inspires them to help others, to soften the scars of this epidemic. These mothers are forever and deeply connected to their children.

They helped me to get welfare to buy a bus ticket, an Outreach Worker accompanied me to the bus, and I reached into my pocket and pulled out a half mickey and said, 'I don't think I'm going to need this anymore'.

I got my old job back and it's been 6 ½ years since.

They helped me time and time again, and not just me, everyone out there.

They really helped change my life because they were there, and they really understood."
